- Can you tell we how old you were at the beginning of the Blitz?

When the Blitz started, I was eight years old and today, I'm ninety years old.

- How did you learn about the beginning of the war in September 1939?

I learnt it in the street with the newspaper seller.

- How did your evacuation happen?

It was in October 1940. My mother took me to school; It was the meeting point for the evacuation. The billeting officer took me from London to a host family in Cornwall. It was very horrible because the journey by train was long. I didn't eat nor drink all the time. I had just one bag for my clothes. I had a label around the neck with my name and my address.

-How did you live there?

-I had a new father, mother and a little brother. The house was very big and there was a big garden too. I had a bedroom on my own but the school was really horrible because the system of education was very strict.

I always felt very sad because the years were very long. I stayed there four years. I never complained because I always kept hope in my heart to see my family back in London.

What happened to you after the war?

I came back to my real house and went back into my family. We were very happy to live together.
